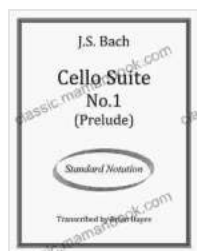


Johann Sebastian Bach's Cello Suite No. 1 Prelude: A Masterpiece of Baroque Music

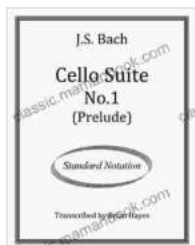
