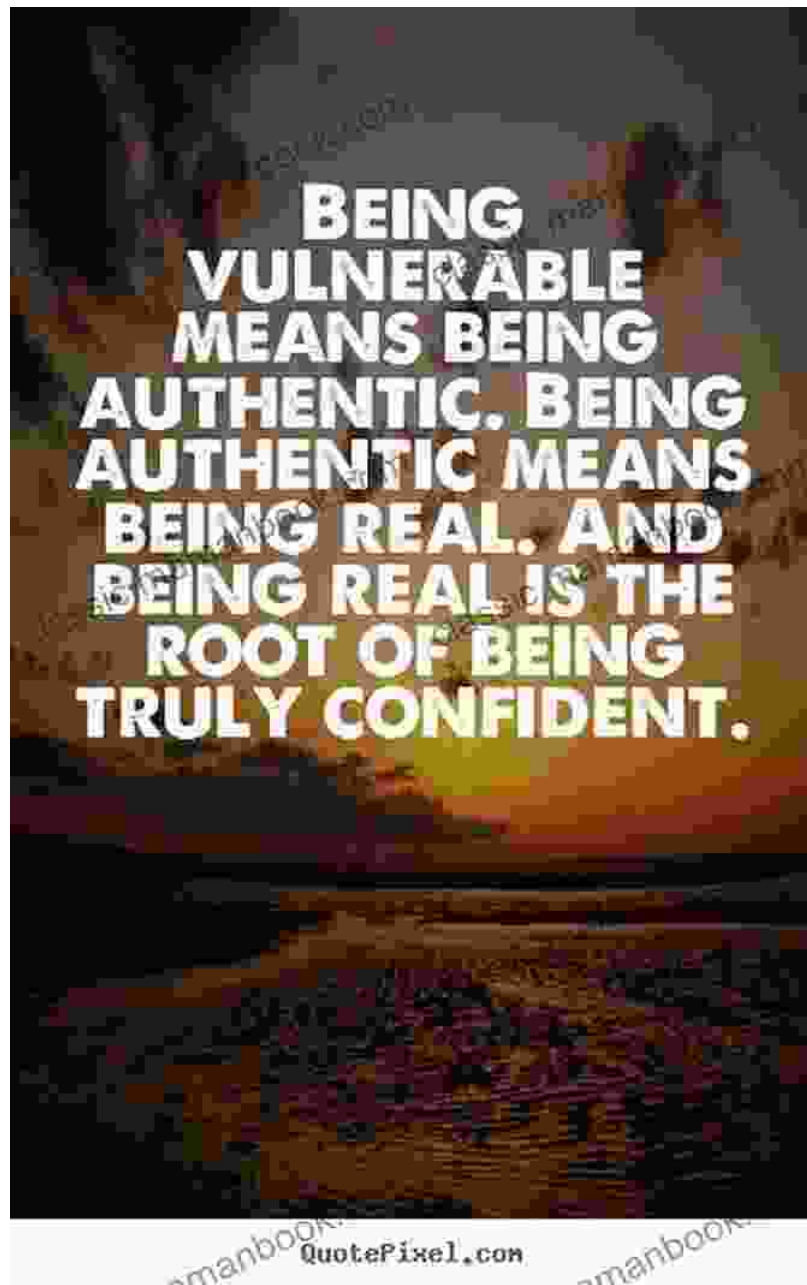
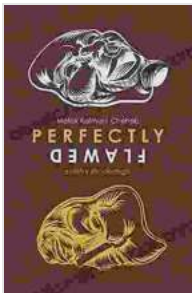

But, remember. She will never let you walk along her spine that way...

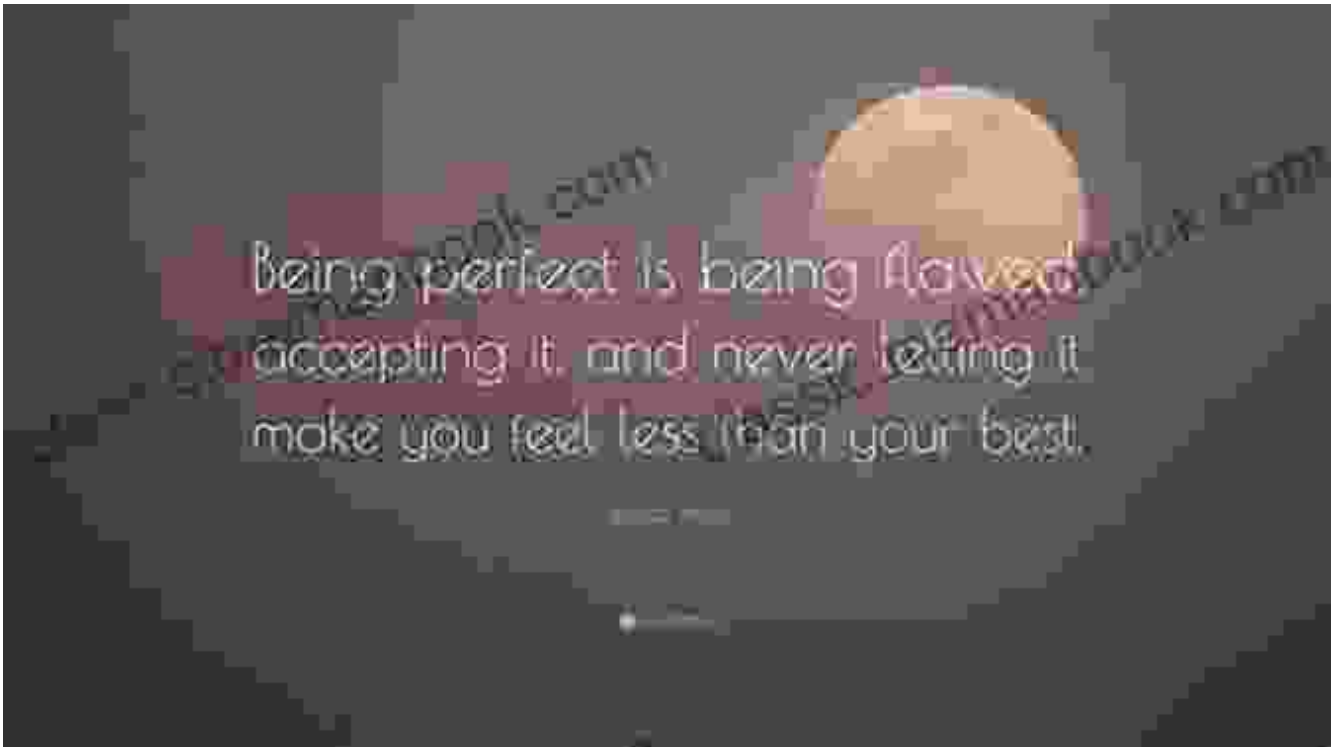
It simply is not the order of things. This is how they will allow you to 'participate.'

challenge the status quo, stand up for what is right, and strive for a better world.



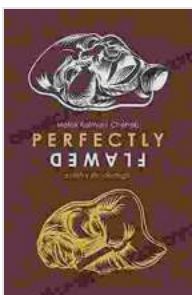
Examples of Perfectly Flawed Poetry For Change

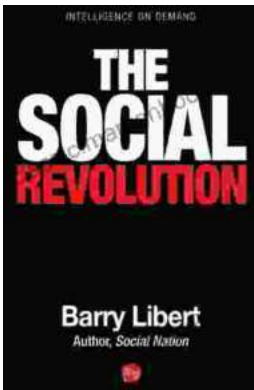
